

The Majority of U.S. Small Businesses are Self-Employed




FACT: 79.66 percent of small businesses in the United States are self-employed.

Big Business vs. Small Business





FACT: 99.9 percent of all businesses in the United States are small businesses, with three-fourths representing the self-employed.

Self-Employed Businesses have Grown Faster than All Other Segments


Average Growth Rate of All Businesses 1999-2009

Self-Employed Businesses are Helping to Drive U.S. Economic Growth

- The United States added nearly 350,000 self-employed businesses between 2008 and 2009, bringing the total to 21.7 million, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. This is a .2 percent growth rate over one year.
- The self-employed added \$923 billion to the U.S. economy in 2009, down from \$962 billion in 2008, which is a .5 percent decrease.
